Centennial's preliminary budget would cost homeowners \$106 more

The Centennial School Board unanimously passed a \$116 million preliminary budget that includes a 3.09 percent tax increase, which for the owner of a home assessed at the district average, means an increase of about \$106.

If the higher levy holds, a resident with a home assessed at the district average of \$26,400, will pay a school tax bill of \$3,609. The district millage, now 132.687, would rise to 136.720. A mill translates to \$1 in tax for every \$1,000 of a property's assessed value.

The 3.09 percent hike includes 0.59 percent for the Public School Employees' Retirement System. Without the exception, the tax increase would be 2.5 percent, the level allowed by Act 1, the state's property tax law.
